




### THE HILLIARD RIFLES



### Donated to the Town of Cornish by Mr. Robert C. LaClair


One of Bob LaClair's last wishes was that his two Hilliard Rifles hang in the New Cornish Town Office on Town House Road, near the Hilliard Gunshop where they originated. Around 1824, Mr. David Hall Hilliard established his gun manufacturing shop on Townhouse Road near the Junction with Center Road. A gunsmith by trade, Hilliard carried his art to a high state of excellence and had a wide reputation for the manufacture of rifles and other firearms.

David Hilliard's house, pictured here, was located across the road from his gunshop. He was active in town affairs, serving on the school board and as Justice of the Peace for twenty-five years. He was buried in Comings Cemetery on Root Hill Road in 1877.








